May in the Field

Spring Migration in South Florida is typically known not for the birds we expect to see at this time of year, but for those sightings that are completely unexpected. That is the case again this spring, as just a few mega-rarities have completely dominated the local birding headlines.

In late April, birders rushed to Highland Oaks Park near Aventura to see a Kirtland's Warbler (pictured above), a bird recorded in Miami-Dade County on only two previous occasions. The other rarities were all spotted earlier in the month in the Key West area: Piratic Flycatcher and Fork-tailed Flycatcher, native to Central and South America, and

Pearly-eyed Thrasher, native to a few islands in the Caribbean. The Pearly-eyed Thrasher sighting was the first for North America!

As Spring Migration winds down this month, and before this warm, breezy weather yields to sweltering summer heat, join us on May 4 at <u>Key Largo Hammocks State</u> <u>Botanical site</u> for a chance to spot Mangrove Cuckoo, White-crowned Pigeon, Gray Kingbird and Black-whiskered Vireo.

Global Big Day, a.k.a. World Migratory Bird Day, takes place on Saturday, May 11. The 24-hour event challenges birders the world over to submit their bird sightings to Cornell University's Lab of Ornithology. Conceived by the esteemed Ornithology program in 2015, Global Big Day is intended to inspire more participants to contribute their observations to Cornell's global bird database. Multiple checklists may be submitted on Global Big Day via the eBird website or the eBird Mobile app. Birding time must be at least 10 minutes for each checklist submitted.

Please note that <u>REGISTRATION</u> is required for all trips.

Conservation News

Biscayne Bay Rookery – TAS Bird Survey Results





TAS and our partner conservation groups continue to lobby for better protections for an established Biscayne Bay marine bird nesting rookery on Mangrove Island, located off of Morningside Park.

Our team has been surveying Mangrove Island each month, and reporting the data to relevant government agencies, including the City of Miami, which owns the island. In our March survey, TAS identified 18 bird species and recorded 477 individual birds roosting here, among them one state-threatened Tricolored Heron (*pictured*) and two immature state-threatened Little Blue Herons. Most notable are the Brown Pelicans and Double-crested Cormorants actively nesting here.

Because Mangrove Island is a lifeline and literal oasis for birds and other wildlife, and to prevent nest abandonment caused by human disturbance, we must all continue to advocate for more aggressive and meaningful action to protect the island's avian residents and migratory visitors.
